Accessing Library Resources – Tips

I. Searching for periodical articles

On-campus access: <http://www.cune.edu/librarydatabases> > [name of database] Off-campus access: <http://www.cune.edu/librarydatabases> > [name of database], then enter CUNE email account username/password as prompted. Click on <http://www.cune.edu/staffweb/tom.krenzke/proxydemo.html> for a tutorial.

- For citations including the full text of the article, print, save, and/or email the article.
- For citations without the full text of the article, use <http://www.cune.edu/librarydatabases> > Journal Finder to find out if any other CUNE online database contains full text articles for that periodical title. To find out if the CUNE library holds the issue you need in paper, search by “Periodical title” at <http://www.cune.edu/library> > search the catalog.
- *Articles not available in full text from a CUNE online database or not held in the CUNE periodical collection are available via interlibrary loan – use electronic request at <http://www.cune.edu/libraryILL> ; pink paper request available in the CUNE library; or electronic request in CUNE library subscriptions to EBSCO or FirstSearch databases. Allow 24 hours to 5 business days or more for pick up at the CUNE library circulation desk; cost for undergraduates is 25 cents per request – waived for graduate and degree completion students.*

II. Searching for books

- CUNE library catalog: <http://www.cune.edu/library> > search the catalog > advanced search. View your circulation record and renew library materials by selecting “My account” – stop at the CUNE library circulation desk to create a User ID/PIN to access “My account.” To search all consortium libraries, select “Library” > all.
- eBook Collection. For electronic books from EBSCOhost: Go to <http://www.cune.edu/librarydatabases> > Academic Search Premier > Choose Databases > eBook Collection. Off-campus users are prompted for CUNE email account username/password.
- WorldCat: <http://www.cune.edu/librarydatabases> > FirstSearch > WorldCat. Allows electronic interlibrary loan requests – “See more details for locating this item” > “Borrow this item from another library,” fill out electronic request > Submit (automatically received by CUNE library).
- List of other library electronic catalogs: <http://www.nlc.state.ne.us/libraries/nelib.asp> (Nebraska) or locate any library online catalog <http://www.libdex.com/> or <http://lists.webjunction.org/libweb/>.
- *Books not held in the CUNE library collection are available via interlibrary loan – use electronic request at <http://www.cune.edu/libraryILL> ; blue paper request available in the CUNE library; or electronic request in CUNE library subscriptions to EBSCO or FirstSearch databases. Allow 24 hours to 5 business days or more for pick up at the CUNE library circulation desk; cost for undergraduates is 25 cents per request – waived for graduate and degree completion students.*
