SEASON PREVIEW

Bulldogs look to build on breakthrough 2013 season

In many ways 2013 represented a breakthrough campaign for Concordia football. In head coach Vance Winter's fifth season, the Bulldogs raced out to a 6-0 record and were ranked as high as No. 14 in the national poll. The team's 7-4 record marked the program's first winning season since sharing the GPAC title in 2001.

Concordia's first loss, a 30-28 classic at eventual playoff qualifier Northwestern, began a four-game skid and took it out of playoff contention in what was mostly a thrilling year. However, that period of frustration has Winter and company determined for better in 2014.

"We were all disappointed with some of the close losses we had last season, but we also know that for us taking the next step is a lot harder," Winter said. "There are enough steps and challenges going from being bad to OK, but taking the next step from being OK to being a playoff contender is difficult. That's our goal."

With 14 starters returning (eight offense, six defense), Concordia may be primed for even better in 2014.

Quarterbacks

Von Thomas, now with 23 career starts under his belt, is the unquestioned leader of the offense. In 2013 he set a program record for total offense in a single season and has piled up nearly 5,000 total yards in his two seasons as the starting quarterback. His most impressive traits, according to Winter, are his leadership qualities.

"I'm more impressed and more proud of him for an outside-of-football maturation standpoint," Winter said. "He's grown as a person. The talent's always been there. You never know how a guy's going to perform under pressure situations. He shows toughness, work ethic – all those characteristics."

There is competition behind Thomas. Junior Garrett Folchert held down the No. 2 spot on the depth chart throughout the 2013 campaign but he'll have young quarterbacks like redshirt freshman T.J. Austin nipping at his heels.

Running backs

There's much more certainty at the running back position than at this time a year ago. The sophomore duo of Trey Barnes (464 rush yards, seven touchdowns) and Bryce Collins (704 rush yards, 11 touchdowns) combined for 1,168 yards and 18 touchdowns on the ground last season. The two rookie backs were a big reason why Concordia possessed the ball for nearly 35 minutes per game in 2013.

"They've both (Bryce Collins and Trey Barnes) had a great offseason and worked very hard," Winter said. "Bryce has



put on some weight and is really explosive in the weight room, doing some great things out here every week. Trey is also continuing to gain size and strength." Sophomore Demarques Saulberry of Beamont, Texas, could also see carries in a deep backfield. Saulberry caught Winter's attention with a big spring performance. At fullback, the Bulldogs have starter Jerad Leifeld back.

Receivers

With three of four players listed at flanker or split end from last year's final two deep having moved on, there are plenty of opportunities for newcomers in the competition to catch passes from Thomas. Among holdovers, junior Riley Herren of Lone Tree, Colo., popped in the spring and may have the inside track on one starting spot. Winter and his staff are also excited about several freshmen who will be counted on to make early impacts.

"There's some talent in that group," Winter said. "The thing is we're going to be young and inexperienced there. We lost Jeff Balz and Derek Klaus who were mainstays for us the past two years at receiver. I'm excited to see some of the guys step up that went through this spring."

Tight Ends

The tight position is in good hands with junior Josh Slechta, who recorded career highs with 23 catches for 322 yards in



2013.

"Slechta going into his junior year we expect him to really come into his own and be the consistently dominant player he can be," Winter said. "All the tools are there and he's shown a lot of great things. We're really excited about him becoming a dominant player."

Offensive Line

The offensive line returns almost entirely intact with only honorable mention all-GPAC center Dylan Klassen departing. The unit will be anchored by senior right guard Josh Powell, a second team all-conference pick in 2013. He'll see familiar faces around him in left tackle Glennon Manninger, left guard Ben Balduc, center Adam Aschenbrenner (three starts in 2013) and right tackle Sawyer Birtell. Winter and the staff like the progress of the sophomore Birtell, who has ideal size at 6-6, 300 pounds.

"We were pleased with those guys in the spring," Winter said. "I think we've got a group that's physical and continues to get better. It's not very often you get a chance to grow and play in a couple-year period with a group of guys. They had a good spring."

Defensive Line

An experienced defensive line, including senior stalwarts Alex Melius and Kyle Rakow, figures to be the anchor of another strong defensive unit. Junior Michael Gill (7.5 tackles for loss, three sacks) is an emerging star who will make life tough on opposing offensive lines. There's also huge sophomore Ronald Jackson, who is a space-eating nose guard. This group figures to be stout against the run. Winter hopes it can also put more pressure on the quarterback.

"That's a group that could be very good," Winter said. "It's a physical group. I think Michael Gill has a chance to be really, really good. He's a very strong explosive guy. Kyle and Alex have played a lot of football. I'd like to see both of those guys step up and make more plays rushing the passer and get a few more sacks."

Linebackers

The linebacker spot will see the most transition with first team all-conference standout Langston Jones having graduated and Drew Baxter moving back to his more natural safety spot. The only starter remaining is Nakemm Evans, who coaches hope is ready for a breakout season. One of the stars of the spring was senior Michael Carroll, who now has his opportunity to grab the spotlight after serving as a backup to Jones in 2013. Newcomers could also see time in coordinator Patrick Daberkow's 3-4 scheme.

"I was pleased with how they played in the spring," Winter said. "It was one of those areas where we had some question marks going into the spring but if those guys continue to improve at the rate they did in the spring, we're going to be fine. I think Nakemm coming back more experienced and having a defined role – I think he's going to have a good year. I thought Michael Carroll was one of our best players in the spring."

Secondary

Despite the losses of GPAC Defensive Player of the Year Darnell Woods at safety and all-conference corner Derek Blessing, the Bulldogs feel good about a secondary that last season led the NAIA in fewest passing yards allowed per game. Junior Tait Sibbel (team high five INTs in 2013) enters his third year as a starter at safety and is joined by Baxter, who converts back to the position he played prior to 2013. Senior Landon Oelke has starting experience and can play either corner or safety. Sophomore Matt Keener (2 INTs, 1 TD) could lock down another corner spot. Adam Vogt, a four-year member of the Concordia basketball team, has joined the football squad and also figures to be right in the mix at corner.

"Those two guys give you a lot of confidence back there," Winter said of Baxter and Sibbel. "They're going to do the right thing, get our defense lined up right, communicate well and be physical guys in the back end. Landon Oelke has been our junkyard dog. He's just a really good football player. We feel comfortable lining him at a lot of spots."

Specialists

Second team all-conference junior kicker Adam Meirose is the only returner among a group that has been a big part of Concordia's improvement over the past few seasons. The Bulldogs will break in a new punter with the graduation of Joe Marshall. They also must replace electrifying return man Derek Blessing. There are a host of players in the running such as Trey Barnes, Bryce Collins, Eddie Narvaez, Adam Vogt and incoming freshman Jordan Slough, a Nebraska Shrine Bowl participant.

BIO

Vance Winter completed his fifth season as head football coach at Concordia University in 2013. He was named to his current post in December of 2008. He owns a career record of 23-31 overall and 18-29 in GPAC action in his five seasons as head coach of the Bulldogs.

Since his promotion to head coach, Winter has progressively built up the program into a playoff contender. In 2013 the Bulldogs began the season at 6-0 and rose as high as No. 14 in the national rankings. Concordia finished 7-4, marking the program's first winning season since 2001.

Over the last 19 games, Winter has guided Bulldog football to a record of 12-7. Included in that stretch was a momentum-building upset of No. 11 Northwestern on Oct. 13, 2012. Then on Oct. 12, 2013, the Bulldogs took down No. 22 Nebraska Wesleyan, 19-3, in the NAIA Game of the Week. Concordia completed 2013 with a record of 3-1 against its GPAC Nebraska rivals.

Winter is the ninth head coach in the university's nearly 90 years of football history. He was promoted from within, having served previously on the Bulldog staff for two years as the defensive coordinator and two years as the linebackers' coach.

During his coaching career, Winter has made stops at Peru State College (defensive coordinator, linebackers 2004-05), Wayne State College (linebackers 2002-04), and Dakota State University (running backs 2000-01).

Winter was a four-year letter winner while playing middle linebacker for Dakota State University. A team captain in 1999, Winter was a two-time honorable mention all-conference linebacker for the Trojans and the team's leading tackler in 1998 and 1999.

Winter earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Dakota State University in 2002 and a master's degree in sport management from Wayne State in 2004. Winter lives in Seward, Neb., with his wife Tanya, son Jackson and daughter Clara.



ASSISTANT COACHES



CURRAN WHITE, Assistant Head Coach/Off. Coordinator Curran White completed his second season as the Bulldogs' assistant head coach/

Under White's direction, the offense has improved steadily in both seasons. The Bulldog attack went from an average of 16.7 points per game and 249.5 yards per game in 2011 (pior to White's arrival) to 24.0 points and 306.5 yards per contest in 2012. In 2013 Concordia made another leap, averaging 26.4 points and 360.0 yards per game.

Under White's tutelage, playmaking quarterback Von Thomas has blossomed. The junior signal caller has piled up 4,808 yards of total offense over the past two seasons. Thomas broke single-season school records for total offense (2,508 yards), completions (197), pass attempts (334) and completion percentage (59.0).

White came to Concordia after spending seven seasons as the offensive line coach/run game coordinator at Missouri Valley College (MVC). Prior to that, coach White spent four seasons at Wayne State College, first as graduate assistant (2001-02), then as an assistant coach (2003-05).

PATRICK DABERKOW, Def. Coordinator, Linebackers

Patrick Daberkow completed his his seventh year with the Bulldogs in 2013. He spent three seasons as the secondary coach and has spent four years as defensive coordinator for the Bulldogs. Daberkow is also the football program's recruiting coordinator and works with the linebackers.

The 2013 Concordia defense reached impressive heights under Daberkow's direction. 2013 GPAC Defensive Player of the Year Darnell Woods led a unit that ranked No. 1 in the NAIA in pass defense (134.7), No. 5 in total defense (285.5) and No. 5 in scoring defense (17.3). Woods joined defensive lineman Dylan Heithoff and Linebacker Langston Jones with first team all-GPAC honors. Safety Tait Sibbel received second team recognition.

In Daberkow's four years as defensive coordinator, Concordia has produced a total of 13 first or second team defensive selections. Woods became the school's first ever GPAC Defensive Player of the Year.

In 2012, the Concordia defense limited opponents to 22.6 points per game (33rd in the NAIA) and a respectable 356.3 yards per game while forcing 23 turnovers on the season. Woods emerged as a star, picking off five passes and earning first team all-conference honors.

CORBY OSTEN, Special Teams, D-Line, JV Head Coach

Corby Osten finished his sixth season as an assistant coach with the Concordia University football program in 2013. Osten, a native of Columbus, Neb., is the special teams coordinator and defensive line coach for the varsity squad. He is also head coach for the junior varsity team at Concordia.

Osten led a Concordia special teams unit that ranked among the nation's best in 2012. The Bulldogs' Derek Blessing led the NAIA with 388 punt return yards and three punt return touchdowns and kicker Kenny Zoeller racked up the second most field goals nationally with 15. As a team, Concordia ranked fourth in the NAIA in average yards per punt return (16.6) and 11th in average yards per kick return (22.9).

The 2013 unit came through with solid contributions once again. Blessing received first team all-conference honors as a kick and punt returner and sophomore kicker Adam Meirose replaced Zoeller and earned second team all-GPAC honors.

Biting back: the rebuild of Bulldog football

Fifth-year Concordia head football coach Vance Winter stood before the Bulldog Booster Club gathering the Tuesday following the conclusion of the 2013 season unfulfilled and unsatisfied – albeit for much different reasons than the ones that caused feelings of emptiness after the 2008 campaign. "I'm not ready for it to be over," Winter said just a few days after pummeling Briar Cliff to close the 2013 year with a 7-4 record.

The disappointment set in because Concordia came up, in all likelihood, two wins and perhaps just a few plays short of securing its first appearance in the NAIA playoffs since 2001. But proper reflection yields the realization of just how far the program has come since Winter received the promotion to head coach prior to the 2009 season.

At that time Concordia was coming off a rough 1-9 season – the last under 19-year head coach Courtney Meyer (the program's winningest coach). Winter, a four-year assistant under Meyer, understood that the program would have to endure additional growing pains when he officially took over on Dec. 16, 2008.

"We knew it would take a little time because we were a long ways from competitive in 2008," Winter said. "We were obviously hopeful that (the turnaround) would happen sooner. I was a part of that 2008 season as defensive coordinator and I knew firsthand how far we had to go to become a competitive program."

Since going 11-24 in his first 35 games as head coach, Winter and the Bulldogs are 12-7 over their last 19 games. This season they raced out to a 6-0 start and peaked as high as No. 14 in the NAIA coaches' poll. Five years after being regularly stomped on by the big boys of the conference, the Bulldogs were biting back and sat tied atop the league standings.

"This was a very long and slow process, and credit for this year's team can be given to players and coaches as far back as 2010," said senior defensive lineman Dylan Heithoff. "I would say the two main reasons for Concordia's rise is the change in attitude and work ethic that was instilled by the players and coaches when we entered the program in 2010, and the level of talent that the coaches have been able to recruit over the past four years." The plan Winter and his staff had laid out prior the 2009 season had come to fruition. They had been successful in pulling in recruits who were eager to work hard and ready to buy in.

"We have been very intentional since the start in creating a culture of family, accountability, unselfishness and work ethic," Winter said. "These four things have been the staple of our program every season since we started in 2009 and are just as significant in our program now. As our overall team depth and talent has improved the wins and the competiveness of our program has also improved, but we are a family first and foremost."

Of course, putting a plan into thought or writing is one thing – putting that plan into action is another. Winter had been given the controls of a team that lost many games by lopsided tallies in 2008. These scores weren't lost on opposing coaches who went up against Concordia in recruiting battles.

In his honesty, Winter admits that talented recruits were going to have to take a leap of faith and look past those struggles. That did not stop him from making a push for talented, high-character young men from far and wide.

One of the team's most important recruits in recent seasons hails from The Sunshine State.


"During my recruitment process I didn't really care about

the team's previous records," said junior guarterback Von Thomas, "I wanted to meet the coaching staff. We stayed in contact for a while which was a good thing. It showed that they were interested as much as I was. Our coaches were very approachable. They made me feel welcome on my visit which is hard for someone from Miami to adapt to."

There have also been plenty of key







additions from within the state, such as Heithoff (Elgin, Neb.), electrifying returner Derek Blessing (Ogallala, Neb.), offensive lineman Josh Powell (Kennesaw, Neb.) and tight end Josh Slechta (Kennard, Neb.).

The likes of Blessing and Heithoff saw past the won-lost records. Something special was being constructed.

"We all knew that the football team was struggling and was



am was struggling and was in a rough place," Heithoff said. "But Coach Winter remained optimistic, claiming that the only way to go was up and that big changes were being made during the season and offseason. The positive energy from all of the coaches was contagious, which allowed me to become sold on the direction of the football program."

Concordia saw immediate, but gradual progress in its results on the field. Winter's first team (2009) went 3-7, followed by records of 4-7, 4-7, 5-6 and 7-4 in 2013. The major turning point seemed to come on Oct.

13, 2012, when Concordia upset then No. 11 Northwestern, 17-16, on homecoming in Seward for the team's fourth-straight win.

The momentum spilled over into 2013 with the Bulldogs bursting onto the national scene. They hosted an NAIA national game of the week, garnered the GPAC's Defensive Player of the Year (Darnell Woods) and brought back memories of the glorious 2001 season.

"They bought into the challenge of turning a program around and making a difference," Winter said of his 2013 seniors. "We sold these guys on the quality of the education, the special campus community that Concordia is, and the opportunity to turn a program around. I am grateful to each and every one of them for their commitment and loyalty throughout the process because there have been moments of doubt."

Doubt no more. Concordia football is back.

Said Winter at that same Tuesday booster club outing, "I don't think there's any doubt about where we're going."
